Welcome to the season of Epiphany – well, almost! Until January 6, we are still in the season of Christmas, at least in the church year. Christmas



decorations may start appearing on retail stores as early as August, but usually before the end of December, all Christmas has disappeared. Everywhere, but the church (hopefully!) The 12 days of Christmas do not

come before December 25, but after. Counting down to January 6, the date set for Epiphany, also known as the Visit of the Magi. The wise men from the East, following the star, who came to bring their gifts at the manger – gifts of gold (for a king); frankincense (for a priest) and myrrh (an embalming spice). All point to the person of Jesus, all have symbolic value.

But after the wise men have left and Christmas is over, we enter into a short time in the church calendar year called Epiphany. The season of light. And we celebrate the light that is Jesus, the new-born king, the Light of the world, between the great church seasons of Advent/Christmas and Lent/Easter.

In the northern hemisphere, our days are short and our nights

January Lunch Bunch is at the Grand Buffet, 3320 Highland Ave., after worship on Jan. 11.

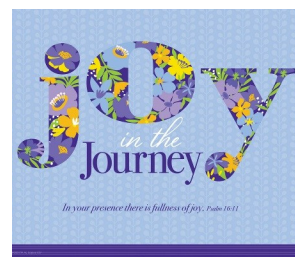
Brighten up your January with another fun **Game Night**, this time hosted at the Prater/Carey home (2624 Petworth Ct., off

A Musing Moment from Rev. Steve

Almost every afternoon after a mid-day nap I meet up with an old friend over a cup of coffee, a cookie and a deck of cards. He goes by the name "Ole Sol." At least that's what my maternal grandfather called him some 65 years ago. I can still see Pawpaw sitting at the dining room table playing a game of cards in solitude (except for me watching and learning, his #1 fan). A card game called "Solitaire." Well, sir, this ripe, aging fruit has not fallen far from the Pawpaw tree.

Now I know some of you play "Solitaire" on your laptop, cell phone or tablet. Not me. I prefer the way God intended it. Cards in hand and hope in heart. I play 3 hands with "Ole Sol" (after all I am a devout Trinitarian). I "keep my fingers crossed" that perchance I just might win one of them. Rarely do. You see "Ole Sol" is a stubborn old cuss and can be as difficult to beat as a contrary mule with a bad *** attitude.

"Solitaire" is simple yet challenging game requiring integri-

ty, patience and a good dose of "Well, maybe next time." You begin by shuffling the deck and laying down 7 cards in a row (one for each day of the week) left to right with Sunday's card face up and the rest face down. Then you add Monday's face up with the rest face down continuing this pattern until the week is finished with 7 cards face up. Now I like this a lot because there is order and surprise from the get go. The remaining cards form "the kitty" (again that's what my Pawpaw called it). Here's where the fun begins. From "the kitty" you turn over 3 cards with the third one face up and playable trying to build columns of cards from the row of 7 with alternating red/black, black/red suits in descending order. When aces appear out of nowhere you place them above the row of 7 columns with each forming a home base. Add cards to home bases by suit in ascending order. The goal is to have all 52 cards in four complete stacks

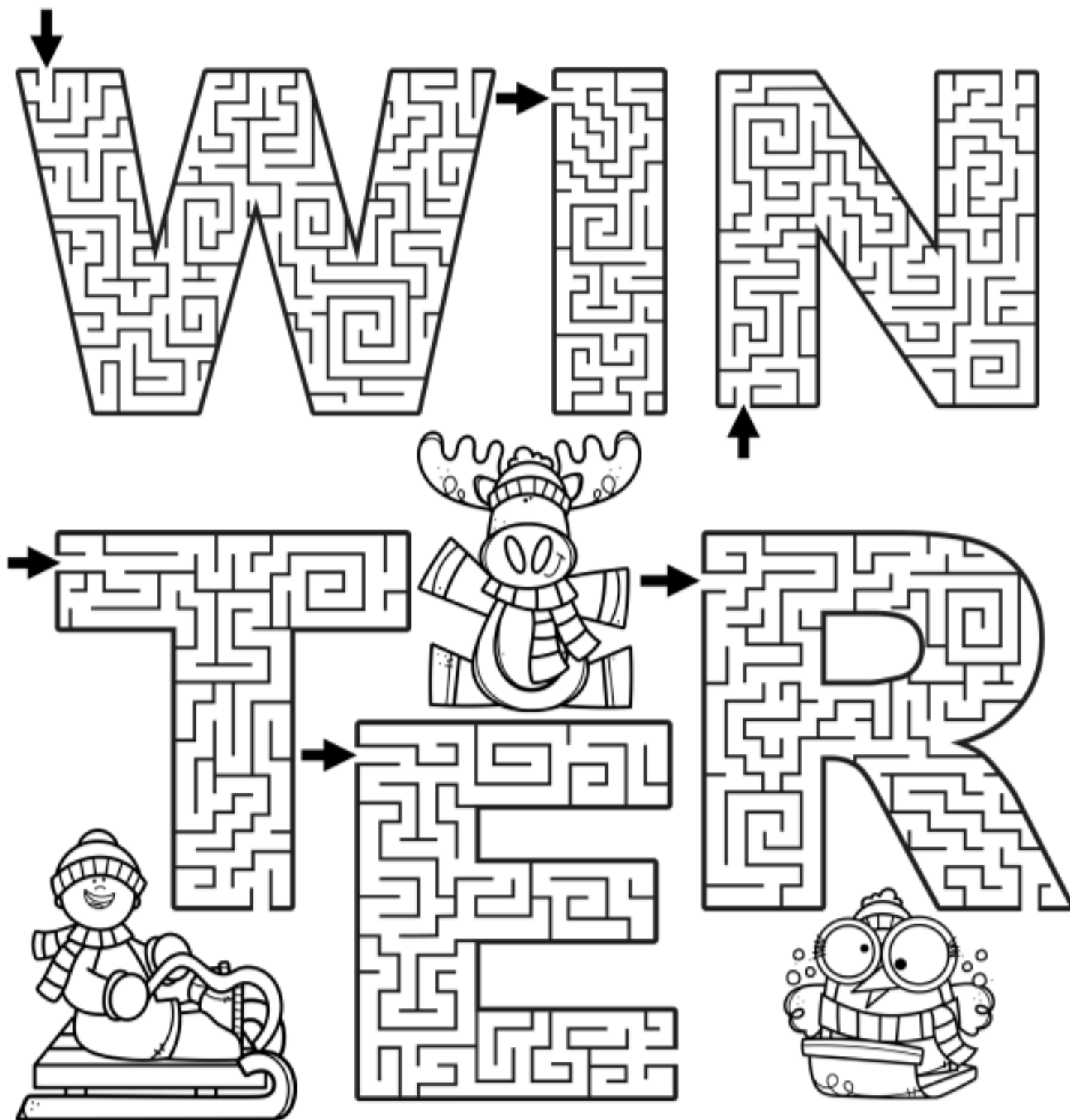
